






Overview of American Legal System



Depositions Are Trial

Pretrial depositions are sworn out-ofcourt testimonies recorded for later use in trials. They serve to gather factual evidence for trial playback, clarify witness statements, and assess the strengths and weaknesses of a case before trial begins.

Process of Conducting Depositions

Depositions typically involve attorneys asking witnesses a series of questions, which are recorded by a court reporter and/or a videographer only. These sessions can take hours and require thorough preparation to ensure comprehensive and relevant information is obtained.






